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

Why would a new student miss almost every day of the first five weeks of school?

Belove Moore, the Beech Acres Peer Support Provider, made a connection with his home and discovered that Tanner* was being taken care of by his grandmother – and she needed help.

After connecting with support through our *Kinship Connections* program, grandma and Tanner began to have more stability in their lives, which led to improved attendance.

Your gift empowered grandma to be more confident in raising Tanner and helped improve his attendance.

Once Tanner returned to school, it became clear why he did not want to come to school. He demonstrated sensory needs that presented an obstacle for him to fully engage in certain areas of the school and times of the day – which is what he was trying to avoid by staying at home.

His sensory issues coupled with

His sensory issues coupled with increased anxiety was causing him to feel disconnected from his teachers. Our team was able to advocate for him to the teachers and find ways for them to connect through his strengths of curiosity, perseverance, and love of learning.

Having access to mental health services right in Sayler Park School eliminated the transportation barrier. Tanner began making major progress across all areas; his truancy decreased, he made great strides in therapy, his grades improved, he was making friends.

Then, just days away from being released from services, Tanner's grandmother suddenly died.

Tanner switched schools to live with his uncle, but our team stayed with him to help him during his grieving and transition. Fortunately, because of earlier interventions, Tanner had developed the resilience he needed to continue to succeed.

A child's anxiety is lessened when she learns she can connect to her therapist via telehealth

The importance of regular mental health check-ins, especially during times of uncertainty, is obvious. **But how well can therapists connect with their clients over a computer screen?** Courtney Meder, a therapist at Hays-Porter Elementary School, found out during a recent online session with a client.

Courtney was discussing "feelings" with Maddie*, a 4th grader at Hays-Porter. Courtney asked when Maddie would feel certain emotions. When talking about "worry", Maddie said she worries that Courtney will forget to contact her on the day of their online session.

Kids like Maddie are feeling the effects of social isolation. They're missing their friends, teachers, therapists, doctors, and family. They are missing human interaction. Therapists like Courtney have been able to quickly pivot and adapt to telehealth, **maintaining continuity of services** with minimal disruptions to 652 kids like Maddie since the crisis began.



Kids are accessing online curriculum and continuing their education

The coronavirus pandemic laid bare inequalities in our schools around technology, including access to equipment and reliable broadband. One family in Sayler Park found their son unable to participate in distance learning. While they had access to broadband, they did not have equipment for their son to connect online with his teacher and classmates.



After a same-day donation of a reliable, clean laptop from Encore Technologies, this little guy is online and learning!

A mom is empowered to help her child succeed with distance learning

A single mother in the Kings Local School District was concerned after her daughter's school moved to distance learning to comply with the state's stay-at-home orders. Her daughter **struggles with behavioral issues at school** but was receiving the support she needed through Beech Acres' Beyond the Classroom™ school-based program. Suddenly, mom was **responsible for not only her daughter's emotional needs at home, she was now forced to support her academically as well**.

Alyssa Rieman, the Beech Acres Parenting Center Team Lead at her school, responded quickly to make sure this family had what they needed to survive distance learning. Together, **they created a plan to support both the student, and mom**. Mom was able to learn and implement specific interventions like those used in the classroom, with promising results in her daughter's academics as well as an improvement to the family dynamic.

A grandmother gets groceries and cleaning supplies she needs

Ms. Myra*, a grandparent caring for four grandchildren, called looking for help. She said, "Can you help me out? I don't have enough food, cleaning supplies, and paper products," Dawn Merritt, Kinship Connections Manager recalled. "I told her not to worry." Dawn visited five stores before finding the supplies she needed at a local Family Dollar. "An employee asked if she could help me find anything," Dawn said. "I told her about Ms. Myra's situation, and she told me to wait there." The employee returned with two bags full of toilet paper and supplies. She said she was saving them for her own family, but it sounded like Ms. Myra needed them more. Dawn overnighted the items to Ms. Myra and her family that same day.

Struggling family is equipped to successfully navigate learning and working from home

One family was desperate for help. Work from home, distance learning, cabin fever, and heightened stress and anxiety soon began to take its toll. Control battles erupted

everywhere. Seemingly simple, everyday routines like getting out of bed, getting dressed, completing homework, and helping with chores **became intense fights**. Boredom led to increased screen time, decreased communication, and total frustration.

Their pediatrician referred them to Dave Brewer, a Parent Connext™ Parenting Specialist. Dave was able to work with the family remotely. Dave helped the family view their power struggles as an opportunity for a profound shift at home. The family worked together to establish goals including getting up at a reasonable time, completing chores, finishing their homework, and showing kindness towards their siblings. Their "rewards" included free time, the ability to choose a fun activity or toy, and the most coveted reward of all, screen time for Fortnite, Minecraft, and Snapchat.

Distance learning, working from home, job searching, or applying for unemployment benefits quickly began tying up valuable technology resources in homes. Suddenly the laptop was a coveted commodity. Even among our own staff.

And, for students receiving schoolbased mental health services, access to the internet and a computer was a necessity for their continued sessions virtually, via telehealth.

Mike Franxman, owner of IT Supply Solutions in Florence, Kentucky was able to donate 10 computers to Beech Acres Parenting Center and provide an additional 10 at a deep discount. "It was just the right thing to do at the given time," he said.
