As the country enters its second year of coping with COVID-19, I am quite mindful of the pandemic's near and long-term impact on kids and families. While I am hopeful for a brighter future, I am keenly aware of the magnitude of the work required to get there.

Beech Acres has been preparing for this for over 170 years.

As you know, Beech Acres Parenting Center was founded as an orphanage in 1849 in response to another public health crisis, a cholera epidemic. The typical "family unit" then included children, parents and grandparents living together and working on a farm. Growing urban environments lacked sanitation, clean water and other public services we take for granted today.

These unsanitary conditions spawned the cholera epidemic that killed 4,000 people in our region. The German General Protestant Orphan Asylum was founded as a community response to the need for safe, clean housing for the orphaned children. The modern family structure is significantly different, and today's pandemic is considerably more complex, wide-spread and deadly. It requires a wider community response to which Beech Acres brings its unique strengths in supporting parents trying to cope with unprecedented levels of stress.

More dangerous for our country than the Coronavirus are the historic racial inequities that have plagued us since the United States was founded. We see the disparities every day in the schools, health care systems, and communities in which 40% of the families we serve are African American. Quickly adapting to the growing community awareness, Beech Acres has developed its strategy, in partnership with others, for making a positive impact on this urgent challenge.

Thanks to your generous support, Beech Acres is uniquely equipped to respond effectively to these critical issues. Through our proprietary Natural Strength Parenting™ model, we intentionally build on the unique strengths of each parent, family and community to raise children who are ready to thrive in this uncertain world.

DONOR SPOTLIGHT ANNUAL SUPPORTER DONNA STEINMETZ'S CONNECTION TO BEECH ACRES SPANS DECADES



There are several reasons why people give generously to their favorite charities. They give because they believe in the cause. They may give out of a sense of wanting to be a part of something larger than themselves or to support their community. Often, they give because they have a personal connection to the organization.

Beech Acres Parenting Center began as the German General Protestant Orphan Asylum back in 1849. Donna's mother, Rita Linz and her two uncles, Leonard and Orville Linz were raised here during the 1930s. Amazingly, her father, Donald Brunswick was also a resident. Despite the challenges of their childhoods, Rita and Donald met each other and fell in love while living at the orphange.

The Brunswicks would return to Beech Acres Parenting Center, bringing Donna to the Orphans Feast each summer. An annual festival held to raise money for operations of the orphanage, the grounds, and facilities, the Orphans Feast was a huge community-wide event. "We used to attend the Orphans Feast when I was a child," Donna said.

Fond memories of the annual festival and her familial connection to Beech Acres inspired Donna to give back. "In 1985, I was married and financially stable and started giving to Beech Acres," she said. "I believe I have been giving annually, except for the two years I was laid off work."

Donna's personal connection to Beech Acres didn't end with the Orphans Feast. In the 1980's, as society's norms began to evolve, the idea of orphanages raising children began to change. Beech Acres Parenting Center continued to evolve as well, changing to meet the needs of parents, families, and children in the community through a modern approach to parenting and mental health.

When Donna faced her own parenting challenges, she turned to a known, trusted resource for help.

"When my son was in the fourth grade, he was bullied, and when looking for resources on how to deal with the situation, I called Beech Acres where I found a 'nice lady' to talk to," Donna recalled. "She told me I could call back anytime."
